

## How to make the most of Carol Singing

The Rectory  
St James the Least of All



My dear nephew Darren,

Carol singing is not what it used to be. My fond memories of a group of choristers, muffled in scarves and overcoats, carrying lanterns, and walking from door to door in the snow, as they sang ‘While shepherds watched ...’ had to be suddenly revised when I saw your own music group, in T-shirts inscribed with ‘Jesus loves You’, singing ‘Little donkey’, in your shopping centre. I suspect any money you raised would just about have paid for the electricity used to power your banks of electronic equipment. Singing in the main square of the Centre next to the fountain may have looked good, but it seemed to mean that the choir men were obliged to make constant trips to the lavatory.

Here at St James the Least of All, carol singing is regarded as a staff perk for the choir; the year when the Boys’ Brigade tried to break their monopoly was suppressed with a ruthlessness that would have impressed Genghis Kahn.

Our annual carol-singing route involves months of meticulous planning. We find that a transparent collection box is vital, so that donors can see what earlier patrons have given. This means that those who are bound to put in notes must be visited first – ‘pour encourager les autres’. It also needs a detachable base, so that if coppers are given, they can be removed from sight before the next call.

Those homes that contain several children are visited just after bedtime, so that parents will give generously simply to get the choir to go somewhere else. Veiled threats to stay and sing more carols (unless they give generously) are usually very effective. Getting whoever looks the most innocent and photogenic to ring the bell and ask for money is a far more subtle way of ensuring a donation than planting any number of mafia lookalikes (such as our church treasurer) on the doorstep.

The choir always finishes its evening at the local pub – but again, the timing must be carefully managed. Too early and there will only be the landlord, his wife, and their Labrador to listen; too late and people will be so full of Christmas cheer that any carols will be hi-jacked and become the equivalent of back-of-the bus rugby songs.







## 25th December : Was Jesus born on 25th December?

Almost certainly not. But the story of how that date came to be chosen as His 'birthday' is one that stretches back long before His birth.

it seems to have started on the Greek island of Rhodes in 283 BC. That year the solstice fell on 25th December, and it was also the year that the Ancient World's largest Sun God stature - the 34 metre, 200 tonne Colossus of Rhodes, was consecrated.

By 46 BC, Julius Caesar had made 25th December the official winter solstice. In AD 274, the Roman Emperor Aureilian chose the winter solstice to be the birthday of the Sun God. He also decreed that Sol Invictus (the unconquered sun) was 'Lord of the Roman Empire'.

Fifty years after that, and Constantine had become the first pro-Christian Roman Emperor. He wanted the Church to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ on 25th December. Perhaps it was that to him, Jesus was more or less the same person as the mighty Sun God. Or perhaps he felt that the ancient sun god's association with goodness, light, warmth and life would help ease the people's transition from paganism to Christianity. Whatever the reason, the Church went along with it, and chose 25th December to be the date of Christmas. And in an ancient mosaic in the crypt of St Peter's Cathedral, Jesus is portrayed as adorned with sun rays and riding in a chariot - just like Sol Invictus.

As for the huge, bronze 200 tonne Sol Invictus? He fell over during an earthquake and was sold off for scrap metal in 654AD by an enterprising Arab scrap merchant. Meanwhile, Jesus lives on...

## 26th December : St Stephen the First Martyr

Have you ever stopped to consider that the very first martyr of the Christian Church (Stephen died c 35 AD) was a deacon? (But no, he wasn't worked to death by his church.) It was Stephen, one of the first seven deacons of the Christian Church. He'd been appointed by the apostles to look after the distribution of alms to the faithful poor, and to help in the ministry of preaching.

Acts 6 and 7 tells us all that we know of his life, and the passages seem to suggest that he was an educated Hellenistic Jew. Certainly Stephen's famous challenge to the Jews reveals him to have been learned in the Scriptures and the history of Judaism, besides being eloquent and forceful.



Stephen's proclamation on the day of his martyrdom pulled no punches. He told the Jews that God did not depend on the Temple. The Temple was but a temporary institution destined to be fulfilled and superseded by Christ, who was the prophet foreseen by Moses as the Messiah for whom the Jewish race had so long awaited.

Stephen then challenged his hearers for resisting the Spirit and for killing the Christ, as their fathers before them had killed the prophets. The Jews were so outraged by this that they stoned Stephen on the spot for blasphemy.

As he died, Stephen saw a vision of Christ on God's right hand. The men who were witness to the stoning placed their clothes at the feet of Saul (afterwards Paul), who (to his deep regret later) consented to Stephen's death.

By the fourth century Stephen had his own feast day in both East and West Churches. When his supposed tomb was discovered in 415, his popularity soared. His (supposed) relics were taken to Constantinople and then Rome, along with some stones (allegedly) used at his martyrdom.

Early on the Church made Stephen the patron saint of deacons. In the late Middle Ages he was also invoked against headaches (?!).

In England, 46 ancient churches are dedicated to him, most of them built after the Norman Conquest. In art Stephen is usually given a book of the Gospels and a stone, and sometimes the palm of martyrdom.



## POPULATION CHANGES IN ASTON CUM AUGHTON



*Photograph taken in 1983 showing the junction of Main Street and High Street where the terraced housing has been cleared and grassed over, prior to the building of the Co-op. This was also in the days when we had two banks in Swallownest, The Halifax Building Society shown on the right and the Royal Bank of Scotland on High Street.*

Aston and Aughton have been agricultural villages since Saxon times and grew in population very slowly from the 50 or 60 at the time of the Domesday Survey in 1086 until the middle of the 1800s when it had risen to 700. Changes began with the opening of local mines – Aston colliery in 1830, Fence in 1842, North Staveley in 1865 and Aston Main in 1869. Men and their families came from all over the country to work in these pits. The increase in population can be seen in the census returns: 1861 – 1,000; 1871 - 1,700; 1881 – 2,300; 1891 – 2,700 and 1901 - 2,900.

These people needed somewhere to live and houses were built at Fence for those working at Fence Colliery. North Staveley Colliery built 107 houses south of Mansfield Road, known as Aston Terrace. Skinner and Holford who owned Waleswood Pit, built houses along Worksop Road in Swallownest. Local businessmen also began building and many of them still remain, such as those along Rotherham Road, Aughton Road, Nursery Road, Alexandra Road, King Street, Park Street, Main Street, Queens Road, High Street and Worksop Road. Some of the terraced houses on High Street, Main Street and Park Street were demolished to make way for the Co-op.



## Shops, Pubs and Clubs

Other changes also began, with more local shops and businesses opening, mainly in Swallownest, but also in Aughton and Aston. Pubs and clubs were important meeting places for local men. The Blue Bell in Aston was a public house in the 1700s, the Yellow Lion in the early 1800s. The original Black Bull and the Robin Hood in Aughton were opened before mining came here, both about the 1830s. The present Black Bull was rebuilt in 1907 after the old stone building had been destroyed by fire. The Swallownest Inn and Oak Inn on Worksop Road were built at the end of the 1800s or early 1900s.

Swallownest Social Club was built in 1913 for local miners, steel and other workers. The Miners' Welfare Hall at Swallownest was opened in 1930. The British Legion Club was formed in Swallownest in April 1924 and met in the Oak Inn. The Aston parish branch was opened in January 1939. The Legion built a clubhouse on Eden Grove but it was destroyed by fire in January 1952. It was rebuilt on the same site soon after the fire.

## Churches and Chapels

The influx of mining families also stimulated the building of chapels. The first Methodist church was built in 1843 on Main Street, Aughton. It was followed in 1848 by Swallownest Methodist Church on Rotherham Road. An extension to the chapel was opened on 19th October 1874 and a final extension opened on 7th March 1907. St. Peter's Mission Church opened in 1864 on Main Street, Aughton. In 1864 Fence Congregational Church opened on Sheffield Road, later to become Fence Wesleyan Church. Swallownest Baptist Church on Worksop Road opened in 1877 and it was enlarged in 1892. A new church was built adjacent the old church which opened on 3rd September 1908. Aston Netherthorpe Wesleyan Chapel opened in 1877 in a house in Netherthorpe that had previously been a butcher's shop. It was only used for a few years because in the 1891 census it was a private house. In 1879 a Primitive Methodist Chapel was built at Aston Terrace. This later moved into a new building on Lodge Lane which opened in 1953. This chapel was demolished and Central Methodist Church was built on the same site in 1995. This is the only remaining Methodist Church in Aston Parish.






